

Don't get me wrong, my baseboards and doors are covered in his little nose mucus because he does a lot of "feeling" his way through, but he knows where to jump on the couch and can even find the toy box. We all have our challenges in life and when I find myself feeling defeated or down, Max seems to find me, jumps in my lap, and settles in for a long cuddle. I smile and all the bad melts away. Max is resilient and I love his little spirit.

Cosplay Cooking: May 4, 2021




May and Reading






Little Bird Miriam H


