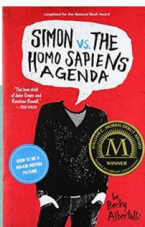
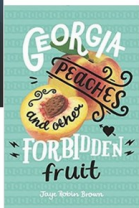
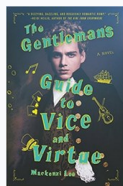

Volunteering in the Library by Lynn A McNeill—Volunteer Coordinator

Prescott Valley Public Library currently has 68 active library volunteers and 45 active Adult Literacy Tutors. We appreciate the time and skills that our volunteers bring to the Library. We have a wide range of ages; from 16 to 90+. Volunteers bring experiences that benefit the library and assist employees, working in a variety of positions.

I have been working with Library Volunteers for the past couple years and have set up a system that works well. Potential volunteers apply online at [Town of Prescott Valley Volunteer Application](#). Once I receive notification of the application, I call and set up a meeting to talk about opportunities. A background check and Human Resource paperwork must be completed and then I will set up a tour and training sessions. Once the volunteer is comfortable with the process, they are set up on a regular schedule. I ask that volunteers commit to at least 2-4 hours per week for six to 12 months.

My last day with the Library is March 24th. I have enjoyed working with volunteers and the transition to the new Volunteer Coordinator should be smooth. I want to thank volunteers and staff for all the support and encouragement that I have received.



Zinio (digital magazines) has changed its name to **RBdigital**. Their new app, **RBdigital**, is now available for download for both Android and Mac or iPhone users. The Zinio app will be going away soon and the best way to access the collection on your device will be through the RBdigital app. If you

have not yet sampled our digital magazine collection, you will want to first go to www.pvlib.net scroll down to the online resources and then select the RBdigital link. Create an account with your library card and PIN. Once you have created an account and established an username and password, you are ready to use your app to check out digital copies of magazines.

Online reading: Instantly read all current and backlist magazines on desktop and mobile browsers.

Mobile apps: Download and read magazines on 95% of today's mobile devices, including iOS (Apple®), Android™, and Kindle Fire™/HD/HDX.

Backlist: Grow your collection and build a digital backlist for anytime checkout and reading.

Easy browsing and checkout: Browse your library's collection by newest issue, keyword search, genre and language to find your favorites and to discover new reading interests.

Two ways to read: Check out magazines and read them instantly on your desktop or mobile browser — or check out and download magazines through mobile apps.

Helpful notifications: Sign up for weekly email reminders about your favorite magazines.

No limit and permanent checkout: Check out as many issues as you want and keep them in your account as long as you wish.
